

The past year continued to be affected by the pandemic and I'm sure that we have all either experienced the virus personally or know a neighbour who has. It has always been the case in Stevington that residents rise to a challenge and with the lifting of restrictions it is good to see village life returning to normal; club meetings and other events have resumed and we are looking forward to the planned Platinum Jubilee events in June.

The village demographic has changed quite a lot over recent years. We have seen, and welcomed, new faces and young children to the village; we sincerely hope these individuals feel comfortable in our friendly community and actively participate in village life.

Governance

The Parish Council has seen a change in Councillors this year:

- Richard Taylor was co-opted in November 2021.
- Aaron Keep resigned in March 2022 and we thank him for his contribution.

Stevington Parish Council (SPC) would like to thank all Councillors (past and present) for their time and efforts working in support of our Parish, which is given on a purely voluntary basis, and remind residents that there is a Casual Vacancy for a Parish Councillor.

Tricia Lennie, our Parish Clerk is resigning from the Parish Council after 6 years and we are now recruiting a replacement. We would like to thank Tricia for her hard work in managing Council business over this period.

SPC is extremely grateful for the support of volunteers who assist by carrying out specific tasks on our behalf.

- Sarah Bush produces welcome packs for new residents coming into the village.
- Stephanie Wingrove checks our three defibrillators weekly, keeps a check on items that have a shelf life and arranges replacements. The defibrillators have been deployed several times recently, thankfully they were not needed but it is reassuring to know the equipment was available.
- Jane Thomas monitors the bottle bank on Court Lane and arranges for it to be emptied when necessary.
- Daniel Norton serves as the Parish Council representative on the William Barringer Charity.
- Gina Thompson completed weekly safety checks of the children's play area but has now resigned, and Mo Botha who has offered to join the rota.

Council Meetings

The Council met in person six times in 2021/2022, members of the public also attended some meetings. If you wish to attend any meetings in the future, please contact our Parish Clerk for meeting details. All Parish Meeting minutes, accounts and procedures can be accessed through the web site, which is managed by our Parish Clerk.

Income

SPC income increased by just over £3,000 in 2021/2022, mostly as the result of a Community Infrastructure Levy payment which arises when new dwellings are created in a parish. During 2021/2022, numbers 1 and 2 Red Lion Cottages were added to the parish. Community Infrastructure Levy payments must be allocated to infrastructure developments and will contribute to traffic management expenses.

Expenditure

Grants were made to village organisations over the year:

- £150 to Stevington Football Club for pitch maintenance.
- £500 loan (repaid) plus £500 grant to Stevington Historical Trust towards the publication of Stevington History revised.
- £20 to the British Legion for the Remembrance Day Poppy Wreath.
- £50 to Stevington Environmental Group for the support of a youth group.
- £1,500 to St. Mary's Church, Stevington, towards upkeep of the Churchyard.

Maintenance of the village surrounds and assets accounts for a significant proportion of our funding, full details are available but in summary:

- £675 for painting of village furniture and play equipment.
- £249 for a new dog waste bin in Church Road.
- £614 for defibrillators batteries (3-year life) and pads (2-year life).
- £89.50 for annual ROSPA inspection of the children's play area.
- £665.50 for a survey of the roads at the Cross as evidence used towards the traffic management case.
- £1,000 for annual insurance cover which includes Stevington Village Hall.

The appointed contractor for grounds maintenance at both St. Mary's Churchyard and the Playing Field gave notice from the end of August 2021. Following this SPC decided to split the contract; in future St. Mary's Church PCC will manage the Churchyard maintenance and a new contractor has been appointed for the Playing Field maintenance.

Staff costs remain static at £4,000 as the annual pay award of 1.75% for 2021/2022 was not nationally agreed until after the end of the financial year, when £70 back-pay was transferred.

The annual accounts have been sent to our internal auditor who reports they all look good and these can be seen on our website. All approved financial documents are available by request from our Clerk who can be contacted at clerk@stevington-pc.gov.uk.

Planning

SPC has always taken its responsibilities seriously with regard to planning applications. Each application is considered on its own merits and in the wider context of the area in which it is situated.

We continually monitor and respond to all the planning applications in writing to Bedford Borough Planning Committee meetings. In determining all planning applications, SPC take account of the Stevington Neighbourhood Plan and the views of the residents of Stevington.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

Stevington Neighbourhood Plan (NDP) was adopted by majority vote on 6 May 2021 and is now a material consideration in all planning decisions made within the Parish. It will be reviewed by SPC on a regular basis to ensure it remains fit for purpose and that it continues to deliver to its stated aims. Stevington NDP will also become a reference

document to the next Local Plan which is scheduled for consultation later this year.

Windmill

The outstanding repairs to the mill were completed by millwrights Dorothea in February 2022, the windmill is now at a standard where it will, once again, be able to turn its own sails. SPC are in discussions with Bedford Borough Council (BBC) and Dorothea to arrange a suitable date for a demonstration of the mill turning, this will be advertised to the village once agreed. The 'Friends Of' group are also in advanced discussions with BBC with respect to visual checks and other support tasks such as basic maintenance etc. Restoration of public access continues to be reviewed by BBC, mainly regarding health and safety aspects, and we hope to be able to share further news on this soon.

Highways

Councillors have spent a considerable amount of their own time liaising with our Ward Councillor, BBC and other bodies regarding traffic management through the village. This is nothing new and has been on the SPC radar for some years.

However, this year we have had some progress, the matters of both a 7.5-ton weight restriction being introduced for Silver Street and a 20mph speed limit for part of the village are at advanced stages with an on-site meeting held with BBC on 4 May. Other road safety measures being pursued include the planned acquisition during FY22/23 of mobile Speed Indicator Devices, activated by vehicle speeds, with some funding being made available by the Ward Fund. During the recent meeting the poor condition of road markings and signage was brought to BBC's attention as a matter of significant concern. There was also a proposal to erect white 'gates' at the Park End and West End entrances to the village, together with 'dragon's teeth' road markings alongside to re-enforce the start of the 30mph limit, these have been shown to slow traffic in other locations. We also hope to have the 30-mph limit at West End extended beyond Hart Farm. The longer-term ambition for average speed cameras being introduced remains a key objective.

We are keen to be made aware of any highway-related incidents, particularly those resulting in a near-miss collision or damage to property and a register for this purpose is in operation. Please provide any such notifications, ideally with a picture and/or vehicle details, directly to the Parish Clerk.

Whilst we appreciate these measures do not solve all our issues, they are a start and something we can build on in the future.

Environment

With increasing concerns over global warming and climate change, SPC supported the establishment of the Stevington Environmental Group. The consultation group will provide a forum for the Parish community to come together to learn about, discuss and debate actions that can be taken to reduce carbon emissions and increase biodiversity of the Parish. Also, Councillors have met with Senior Flood Risk Officials at BBC to establish a Stevington Flood Group supporting mitigation and preventative actions.

Village Hall & Playing Field

Our representative on the Village Hall Executive Committee has worked closely with the committee over the past year to enable the hall to function successfully.

We continue to monitor play equipment in the playing field on a weekly basis. Minor repairs have been undertaken when necessary to keep items serviceable, however, we are aware that the equipment may need more extensive repair or replacement in the long term.

Policing Matters

Stevington remains a low crime area, particularly when compared to other locations also within North Bedfordshire's Rural Community Policing area. The Community Policing priority of 'Motor Vehicles - Crime and Anti-Social use,' determined following local consultations during January and February, will continue into July 2022. Police activities for this priority have so far included 62 sessions of speed enforcement and 7 stolen vehicles recovered across the area.

If you do need to report any crime please dial 999 for emergency situations i.e. crime in progress and police high priority response required. BEDFORD BOROUGH NEWS

Council Tax Energy Payment

You will have heard and seen about the government's initiative to help households with rising energy costs; they have announced a £150 Council Tax energy payment for households living in Council Tax bands A to D, as their main home, and B and E where there is a disabled band reduction.

If you don't pay your Council Tax by Direct Debit you should have now received an 'access code' to get the £150 energy payment.

This code is to ensure that people do not fraudulently apply for payments for homes they don't live in, so that people receive the payment to which they are entitled. You can only get your unique access code by letter and email from the Council, it is not available from the Council's Customer Service Centre.

Once you have received your code, you can complete the form to claim this at www.bedford.gov.uk/counciltax. If you do not have access to a computer, smartphone, or tablet, you can use the free computers at local libraries or call the Customer Services Centre for support on 01234 718097 and press option four.

If you pay your Council Tax by Direct Debit, you do not need to take any action. You will receive your payment automatically after your first Council Tax payment of the year has been taken, to ensure that the Council has the correct details. These payments started in April and the majority of people who pay their Council Tax by Direct Debit have now been paid their £150 Council Tax Energy Payment.

Borough Council Announces Solar Panel Scheme

With the cost of energy continuing to rise a scheme has been announced to encourage residents to come together to invest in renewables through a group-buying scheme for solar panels and battery storage - 'Solar Together Bedfordshire.'

Bedford Borough Council is working in partnership with Central Bedfordshire and Luton Councils as part of Solar Together Bedfordshire.

Solar Together Bedfordshire helps homeowners feel confident that they are paying the right price for a high-quality installation from preapproved installers (www.solartogether.co.uk/bedfordshire).

Bedford Borough residents can join the group-buying scheme which offers solar panels with optional battery storage and EV charge

points, as well as retrofit battery storage for residents who have already invested in solar panels and are looking to get more from the renewable energy they generate as well as increase their independence from the grid.

At this stage, the Council is inviting people to register online to become part of the group. There is no obligation to go ahead with the installation. So if you are interested, please visit:

Northern Gateway Scheme

The final phases of the scheme are underway and should be completed by the end of June. As part of this, there will be overnight closures for resurfacing work to occur. This will have already started by the time you receive this magazine.

Local Plan 2040

The Council has a legal responsibility to set Local Plans, deciding where growth and development will take place in Bedford Borough in future years; from homes and jobs to schools and infrastructure.

Following changes to national policies and the setting of new housing targets by the Government, the Local Plan 2040 is an update of the recently agreed Local Plan 2030, which was adopted in 2020. The majority of the existing planning policies are still up to date and do not need to change. The Local Plan 2040 therefore focuses mainly on a strategy to guide housing and employment growth to meet the Government's targets, and the infrastructure needed to support it.

It also updates planning policies where these have developed since the 2030 Local Plan was written; these include those to do with climate change, environmental quality, the town centre, affordable housing and self and custom build homes.

The Council is legally obliged to plan for a set number of homes every year. New affordability data published by the Government in March 2022 has seen an increase of 40% in the number of homes that must be planned for in Bedford Borough - to 1,355 per year to 2040.

Whilst there are still areas of uncertainty around national plans which impact the Borough, including the Oxford - Cambridge Arc and the precise route for East West Rail, the Council is legally obliged to submit an updated Local Plan by January 2023.

At the April meeting of the Council Executive, they considered the Local Plan 2040 for its next and final stage of consultation. The following was agreed:

- Officer responses to the consultation comments received during the Draft Plan: Strategy Options and Draft Policies consultation June 2021.
- That the Local Plan 2040 'Plan for Submission' and its evidence base documents for the purposes of public consultation be agreed, and that it also be agreed that the evidence base documents will be the subject of a further Executive Decision prior to the commencement of the consultation.

This will enable the preparation of the Local Plan 2040 to progress in accordance with the recently updated Local Development Scheme and that the consultation this summer will be the third on this Local Plan, and the final one before the plan is submitted to Government in January 2023.

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


UKRAINE CRISIS APPEAL

STEVINGTON FOOTBALL CLUB

Our 2021-22 season finally came to an end in early May. After a very promising start, leading the league at one stage and still being potential title contenders at Christmas, our final Bedfordshire County Football League Premier Division league statistics were as follows:

Eighth position from 15 teams, played 28 games, won 11, drawn 4, lost 13, scored 41 goals, conceded 54 goals with 34 points.



After the match we held our traditional end of season club presentations and award winners were:

in the last two weeks of the season as we were unable to get a side, potentially impacting on Sharnbrook's (our local rivals and friends) bid for the league. Then ironically the League then scheduled us hosting the local Cranfield United side at home the following final Saturday of the

campaign, with us winning 5-0 up at the playing field.

The club was extremely pleased for Alex as he has been with the club for 10 years and has been solid and consistent throughout all that period. Thanks to Ian Collins and Tommy McGirl for managing the team over what has been a very difficult last couple of seasons.

In the run up to the end of the season the Bedfordshire County League held a meeting to outline plans to introduce major changes to its Premier League, with the introduction of league appointed Referees Assistants at £35 each per game and an increase in Referees fees to £50 per game (currently £40) for all league games. Despite our club objecting to what will amount to an increase in current officials' costs by £80 per home match, several clubs voted to approve the proposal. Therefore, it is almost certain that this will be introduced from the start of next season, with the actual cost of each home game likely to be close to £200 per game when all other expenses such as pitch hire, first aid kid, laundry costs etc. are taken into consideration.

To keep the club financially sustainable this would require us to increase match subscriptions to £10 or £15 per game and having been involved in collecting players subs for over 30 years we know that this will not be tenable.

Therefore, the unaffordable increase in costs, combined with the challenges of being able to field sides in the closing stages of the season and current players' reluctance to drop down divisions (where the increased costs would not be applied), has resulted in the club deciding that it will not be participating in the league next season and has no option but to fold and cease playing.

This was an exceedingly difficult and emotional decision to consider and make for a number of our long-standing club members. Being involved with the club has been a very important part of our lives, giving us access to structured sport whilst having fun and making lifelong friendships and acquaintances. For those of us living in the village or having strong ties with the village, it was also the realisation of the importance of having sports teams and facilities available in the village to maintain and promote its community spirit.

At least four generations of our family have played for the club and I can recollect our involvement back to the 1960's. In fact, one of my earliest memories is our Dad bringing the kit back home to the cottage we lived in at West End (where the Baptist Chapel Car Park is now) to be washed in the twin tub washer, the water being pumped into a tin bath and Gareth and myself being put in it for a bath before we were put to bed! Gareth, Daz and I are all bitterly disappointed that we have not been able to keep it going longer so that others can have the fun and enjoyment we have had from it.

Stevington Football Club has a long standing and proud history and is currently one of the longest ever-present clubs in the local league having completed every year since the 1960-61 season after having to drop out of the league for a couple of seasons due to having players 'poached' by other clubs due to their success in the 1950's.



There's some fascinating history about the club in the Stevington Historical Trust 'Stevington - The Village History Revisited' publication (pages 268 & 269) and it is well worth a read.

I have to say I have found it extremely hard putting this article together as its obviously

brought back a wealth of very fond, treasured, character and friendship forming memories which it is difficult to put into any form of order.

However, I can't close without mentioning the passion and commitment that Alan Cox and our Dad, both secretaries for many, many years (from 1934 and late 1960's respectively) put into the club so that others could have a local club to play for when there was very little else to do on a Saturday afternoon. More recently we all need to thank and acknowledge Gareth's efforts in keeping the club going; without his input we would have reached this sad position a lot earlier than now.

There are simply too many club characters and friends to remember and thank in this article and I will hopefully do them all due justice in a future edition of the magazine.

We recently returned from our delayed 2020 Stevington Football Saga Trip to Benidorm which incidentally was announced on Radio 2 by Ken Bruce on the day before our departure. We are not sure he believed that the backroom staff and previous sponsors of the club were going away to 'reflect on what they would all do on Saturday afternoons going forward' - whilst away none of us could decide what we would be doing!

Thanks to everyone that came along to support the team, or for the de-brief of the games in the pub afterwards, over the years and special thanks to Nigel and the Royal George team for their continued support and sponsorship after all our matches.

Final special mention to Martin Williams, Steph Watts, Clinton Tathum and Aaron Coker who followed the team home and away whatever the weather and for friendship we have developed over the years.

Environmental Planning for the Future

What do you want your village to be like by 2032? We would like to hear your thoughts and ideas about our local developments, house insulation, energy management, biodiversity, noise, light and other forms of pollution as they affect Stevington and to create our 5 to 10 year vision and policies for the village.



These and many other issues will be discussed in detail at an Extraordinary General Meeting of Stevington Parish Council on Wednesday 8 June, 7.30pm in the Village Hall, Court Lane. We hope you will be able to attend and contribute to the discussion.

To help in planning of the meeting we have prepared a very short survey document. We would like you to complete and return the leaflet before the meeting in June to enable us to prioritise those issues which are most important to you. The survey is inserted within this magazine. If needed, additional copies can be obtained from seg @ btinternet.com.

No Mow May

May is the month when the grass grows most quickly. It is also the time when we have the greatest urge to cut and manicure our lawns. SEG is supporting Plantlife's annual "No Mow May" campaign (www.plantlife.org.uk/uk) and we would like to encourage everyone to leave some unmown areas in their garden to give wildflowers a chance to grow and provide nectar for bees and other pollinators.

SEG Interest Groups

Over the last two months SEG groups have been focusing on community talks.

Yes Group organised a very interesting talk by Olivia Eadie on her work on conservation of turtles on 3 May at the Church room. Olivia worked in Thailand on a turtle conservation project, raised money for Blue Marine and talked about the importance of ocean health to planet health.

The *Biodiversity Group* is planning talks later this year, for example Susan Young has offered to give an open talk entitled "A banquet for pollinators" and Tim Stanbridge has offered to give a talk on his 5-year environmental plan to encourage birds and pollinators on his farm.

Watch out for notice of these talks on SEG Facebook and other social media in Stevington.

The Renewables and Energy Group has continued its series of energy talks. The latest talk by John Chalmers on installing air source heat pumps was held on Saturday 7 May at Yew Tree House Barn. John explained that air-source heat-pumps use more electricity than your current system and can cost a lot to install and run. You must get an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) done first, and you may also need to upgrade your electricity supply cable. As the cost of electricity is currently about three times that of gas, a decision to install this system is about futureproofing yourself against the un-availability of gas and a desire to reduce emissions. This is not a money-saving system as it currently stands. If you want to listen to a recording of the talk, please contact Sally Macdonald.

Trees Planted for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Three new trees, an Amelanchier and two wild Cherry trees, have now been planted at the top of the playing field to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. A plaque will be placed at the site of the Amelanchier and there will be a ceremonial planting and photographic event at the start of the Jubilee celebrations on 2 June.

SEG Governance News

Due to growth in environmental activities, SEG is now an independent community group. A new constitution document for SEG has been prepared and agreed by its members. This will be posted on the Parish Council website. SEG will retain its link to the Parish Council via an environmental councillor who will liaise between the SEG and the SPC, providing feedback and guidance, as needed, on environmental issues.

We are delighted to announce that the Bedfordshire Great Ouse Valley Environmental Trust (Beds GOVET) has been granted charitable status by the Charity Commission and has been entered onto the Register of Charities with the Registered Charity Number 1198830. As a Charitable Incor-



porated Organisation Beds GOVET will promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment of the Great Ouse Valley in Bedfordshire. The trust will work to build greater community engagement in river and land biodiversity monitoring, Citizen Science projects and advance the education of the public in the understanding of the importance of river quality on biodiversity, economic and social activity.

STEVINGTON MAGAZINE - THE FIRST 12 YEARS

I read with great interest the article by Pat Pickup on the History of the Magazine, so I thought I would share with the village the details of how it was put together.

In 1972 I was working as an assistant editor at Reader's Digest and had just moved to (at that time) The Chalet up at West End (later to become The Pyghtle). I had previously moved to The Vicarage in 1957 with my mother who was housekeeper to the Reverend Edward J Bennett, so I knew the village and many of its inhabitants very well. I was married here in 1969 – Donald Macrory and Edward Bennett officiated along with Rev Gilbert Bassett-Pyke, a distant uncle. So my church connections were strong.

The church already circulated a leaflet and my idea was to try and produce something that would encompass the whole parish. I talked to Donald, Avis and Eddie Clayton and Frank Trout – they were all behind the idea, which was then approved by the PCC.

An idea is great by how to expedite! The obvious questions were: How many copies? How to fill with articles? Where to get paper? How to reproduce? How to fund the project? How to distribute? One by one we managed to succeed. By we, I mean Avis and Eddie Clayton (Eddie was Churchwarden at St Mary's) and Betty and Peggy. Other villagers like Albert Markham, Frannie and Paul Hodgkinson were approached at times and gave their advice and funds and time to help the production. I seem to remember only a small amount of advertising in those days — I couldn't find anyone to take on organising this onerous task, but village volunteers helped it to survive until I left the village in 1985.

The first reams of paper were, I seem to remember, given to me by the Editorial Director of Reader's Digest. I went to him to ask permission to use some of the information in Reader's Digest publications. He readily gave permission as long as I only used snippets rather than complete articles. I was working at the time in the Books division of the company and we were publishing a huge variety of subjects so I had plenty of choice.

So now I had a bit of content – gardening tips, countryside themes and nature. I remember Marion Field was quite enthusiastic about the whole project and I often visited her for her wise words and cutting comments! Local articles started to trickle in. Great memories. Gradually we built up a regular input of material.

After trying to do this monthly, the stress became too much, and we realized we were being too ambitious. My memories of early production are now a bit vague, but I do remember purchasing a large Remington typewriter, boxes of Roneo (stencil duplicating paper) and a correcting fluid. The first problems I had to overcome were working out the pagination, folding and stapling.

I do congratulate Ray Wood, Pat and Ian Pickup and Heather and Keith Parkinson for keeping the dream of those early years alive. To me, I can now see the Magazine has now become the beating heart of the village. May it long continue.


After many years of excellent service, Jules has decided to cease cleaning the church and Church Room. We are very grateful for all her hard work and wish Jules well.

GREEN TIPS - TRAVEL

Travel accounts for 20% of global CO_2 emissions so it makes sense to weigh up where we go and how. All the numbers quoted are averages and of course CO_2 emissions for individual journeys will vary depending on the make of vehicle, the load and the weather.

Where?

Use a green booking site such as bookdifferent.com for a vast array of environmentally responsible places to stay or ecobnb.com for organic farmhouses and glamping.

How?

- Almost any rail journey emits less CO₂ than almost any car journey but a car with three people in can be as efficient as taking a train. That is, unless you travel by Eurostar which only emits 6 grams of CO₂ per kilometre. This is because, once in France, the electricity it uses is produced from nuclear and renewable energy.
- We all know that we should fly less especially to parts of Europe
 - and within the UK. The domestic flights are the least efficient emitting 255 grams of CO₂ per kilometre. Their short cruising time makes the extra fuel used for take-off and the descent a larger proportion of the total.



- Long-haul flights of several thousand miles will be more efficient than a car journey of the same length. This is little comfort because the amount of fuel used while cruising is still huge, emitting 150 grams of CO₂ per kilometre, compared with an average 96 grams of CO₂ per kilometre for a petrol car. The difference is that the plane's emissions are shared by several hundred people but no one is going to be driving that far!
- The less you take the less fuel will be used to get there. This will be most noticeable travelling by car or if your journey involves a short flight.

Shopping

• Rather than taking everything buy local while you are there.

- Take reusables: bamboo cutlery, a shopping bag and a water bottle. You can even get a foldable one from Kontiki which filters out bacteria and microorganisms.
- Use a reef-friendly sunscreen. These don't contain oxybenzone or octinoxate which disrupt the DNA of coral and other aquatic life. These and other harmful chemicals in sunscreens are absorbed through our skin too. Look at the Marine Safe website for more details and best of all follow Marine Safe's advice and cover up instead.

ST MARY'S MATTERS

As a sign that things are gradually getting back to normal, the scaffolding has disappeared from the tower after about 8 months. This has been an enormous undertaking, particularly for our treasurer, John Hirst, who has managed the project, and liaised with the church architect and our

stonemason Steve Todd who has demonstrated enormous skill, particularly in his hand carving of detailed stone tracery. This can be seen around the top of the belfry louvres (wood slatted windows).

The total cost, when the final bills come in will work out at around £96,000 including VAT which we can claim back. John's tireless work has managed to achieve grants to offset this to the total of £55,000, a remarkable achievement compared with what some other parishes have managed. Our particular thanks go to him. Prudent care of our accounts by previous PCCs and treasurers has meant that we can afford the balance, rather than having to prune out some recommended repairs.

Services are returning to normal, and there was a great turnout for Easter Day, including five children, and since then we have had one Baptism. The service was followed by the return of our Easter Egg Hunt, where we think some thirty children took part.

We are planning various 'green churchyard' children friendly activities over the summer months, including a Bat Prowl on 15 July and a Churchyard Green Event on the 16 July.

Our volunteers continue to do a grand job in the churchyard, and if you would like to help, head down there on the first Saturday of the month between 10 and 12, though if you're free on any other Saturday you will probably find someone there. We wish to keep the churchyard looking neat, but have allocated an area on the north side, away from the entrance, to leave unmown for May. We hope that is a good compromise for No Mow May.

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The Composing Cook

DOUBLE CHOCOLATE KEY LIME PIE

Serves 8-10

This Double Chocolate Key Lime Pie is light, refreshing and comforting all at the same time. I would advise you to make it and lock it away in the fridge because once you've tasted it; you will be coming back for more.

For The Base & Sides:

- 400g dark chocolate digestive biscuits
- 65g unsalted butter
- 1 tablespoon cocoa powder

For The Chocolate Sauce:

- 20ml double cream
- 100g bar dark chocolate minus 1 square to be used to decorate

For The Filling:

- 4 Limes to give approximately 175ml lime juice
- a bottle of lime juice to make up the difference
- 397g tin sweetened condensed milk
- 300g double cream

To Decorate

- the zest from the limes
- 1 square of dark chocolate taken from the bar above

A 25cm x 4cm deep fluted tart tin, with a loose base. If yours is a little smaller or bigger, that is absolutely fine.

- To begin with, take your limes and grate the zest and put the zest onto a plate along with one square of chocolate taken from the 100g bar dark chocolate.
- Squeeze as much juice out of the 4 limes and then use the bottle of lime juice to make up the difference. Limes vary so much when it comes to giving up their juice, hence why it's a good idea to have the bottle handy. Put the plate in the fridge.
- In a food processor, add the dark chocolate digestive biscuits, the
 unsalted butter and the cocoa powder. Blitz until the mixture
 reaches a damp, binding consistency. Transfer the mixture into
 the tart tin and press on the base and up the sides. Place in the
 fridge.
- To make the chocolate sauce, in a small pan heat the double cream very gently. Whilst it is heating, take the rest of the dark

chocolate bar and break it into pieces and then add this to the warmed double cream. Swill around the pan so all the chocolate is coated with the warm cream, and still with the hob low, and a whisk in hand, start whisking until the chocolate is mixed well with the cream and you end up with a runny chocolate sauce.

- Take the tart tin out of the fridge and pour the chocolate sauce on the base. With the back of a spoon, cover as much of the base as you can. You need to work fast here as the chocolate sauce does set quite quickly. It doesn't have to be perfect as it will be covered over. Put the tart tin back in the fridge.
- To make the filling, pour the sweetened condensed milk and the lime juice into a largish bowl and whisk with either an electric hand whisk or if you have a free standing whisk use that implement instead. Whisk until well combined. Add the cream and carry on whisking until you have a mousse like consistency.
- Take the tart tin out of the fridge and pour the thick mousse mixture into the biscuit base. Use the back of the spoon to get an even coverage. At this stage you need to place it back in the fridge and let it set, ideally overnight, but by all means 4-6 hours should suffice.
- When you are ready to serve, take the pie out of the fridge, grate the one square of chocolate on top and sprinkle with the lime zest. Unmold the pie, but don't even try and remove it from it's base. If you do, good luck.



Cut it into portions and

serve daintily or just devour it. I know which option I would go for.

NEW OUTDOOR GYM COMING TO PRIORY COUNTRY PARK



A new outdoor gym featuring seven pieces of equipment and a calisthenics centre is being installed in

calisthenics centre is being installed in Priory Country Park.

Outdoor gyms have become increasing popular, and this new gym in Priory Country Park will bring a high quality facility to a popular and well-used, Green Flag award-winning park.

This new gym will be on the site of the current wooden labyrinth at Priory. The labyrinth has been at Priory Country Park since 2007 and has had several new features added during its lifetime with art project frescoes, a marble maze and a centrepiece in partnership with the public and students. Sadly, it has now come to the end of its life and a number of its posts have had to be removed already due to decay and vandalism. All the timbers that are salvageable from the labyrinth will be kept and reused for future projects within the park.

The works to remove the labyrinth and install the new gym were scheduled to start on Monday 16 May and are expected to be complete by mid-June.

This new gym follows an upgrade to the deteriorating path around the lake at Priory Country Path to all-weather tarmac pathway, making the lakeside more accessible for buggies and those in wheelchairs.

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THAT WAS THE NEWS THAT WAS

The Huntingdon, Bedford And Peterborough Gazette And Cambridge Independent Press – 27/04/1839

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT – The neighbourhood of Stevington, Beds, has been thrown

into gloom by a melancholy accident which occurred to Mr. Boston, farmer, on Monday last. He was returning from Bedford, on horseback and when near Oakley his horse shied at a gypsy's camp, turned round and galloped back towards Bromham with Mr. Boston clinging to its neck. When near the village he was unable to retain his hold, and fell with great violence upon the road, occasioning a severe concussion of the brain. The horse also fell, and in struggling kicked Mr. Boston on the face. The unfortunate man has since died of the injuries, leaving a wife and seven children. He was much respected, and his loss will be greatly lamented in the neighbourhood.

Bedfordshire Mercury - 04/03/1865

EXHUMATION OF THE BODY Of AN INFANT - On the 15th ult., Mary Ann, the infant daughter of John and Rebecca Purser, died and was buried without having the rite of baptism administered to it. About a week previous to its death the child's arm was broken, but how that was done remains a mystery. On the day of its death, Mr. Webb, assistant to Mr. Godfrey, surgeon, of Turvey, saw it, when the fractured arm was much inflamed and swollen, and it died soon after he left. Rumours having gained currency in the village that the deceased had not been properly treated, and it having been stated that the mother had told her neighbours that the child's arm was fractured through Purser knocking her over the cradle, the body of the deceased was exhumed, and submitted to a post mortem examination by Mr. Godfrey and Mr. Couchman, of Bedford. An inquest was held at the Red Lion, on the 23rd ult., before Mr. Whyley, deputy coroner for the county, when Mrs. Purser was subjected to a searching examination, but she affirmed that she and her husband had lived on good terms; she "noticed" the child's arm on the 12th, but could not say how it became fractured. The medical evidence went to show that the internal organs of the deceased were in a healthy state; there were no marks of violence about the body other than the fractured arm. Death was the result of natural causes, and was accelerated by the injury to the arm. The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony.

Bedfordshire Times and Independent – 14/07/1916

Private Christopher Allen has been invalided home after an operation for appendicitis, and is now in hospital at Sheffield. His brother, William, was killed at the front a few months since. The former was very anxious to see his father, who was dangerously ill, but was unable to do so, although he had to pass through Oakley and near to Stevington on his way north. Mr Allen, senior, died on Monday evening. Great sympathy is felt with the widow and family.

Bedfordshire Times and Independent – 21/07/1916

Mr. Thomas Allen, of Stevington was laid to rest in the churchyard on Friday amid every token of sympathy and respect. He was 55 years of age, and before his death had borne most patiently for some months an illness arising from a chill contracted after influenza. He will be much missed in the village as he was an excellent workman, and could turn his hands to any job, being especially useful in the work of thatching. He was born at Oakley, but had lived at Stevington since his marriage. This has been a stricken home, one son having been killed in France, and the remaining son, Trooper Chris Allen, of the Beds. Yeomanry, is at present in Willersley Hospital, Cromford, near Matlock. The mourners included Mrs. Allen; Mr. J. Lovell, son-in-law; Mrs. Lovell and Mrs. Robbings, daughters; Misses Olive and Phyllis, daughters; Mrs. Wm. Sanders; Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Keech; Mr. and Mrs. Glidle; Mr. Sharman; Mrs. A. Cox; Mrs. H. Bowyer; Mrs. Colman; Mrs. Q. Curtis; Mr. G. Ruffhead and Mr. J. Panter. There were many floral tributes.

Bedfordshire Times & Standard - 27/09/1946

STEVINGTON SAWMILL ACCIDENT - Man's Death in Hospital.

An inquest was held at the Bedford County Hospital on Wednesday on Mr. Walter Church, aged 55, sawmill operator who after receiving severe head injuries at the Stevington Mill on 7th September, died at the County Hospital of bronchial pneumonia twelve days later.

Mr. George Woods, of 12 Silver Street, a workmate said they were cutting a large piece of elm with a branch attached. After cutting off the branch Mr. Church slid it away, but it caught in the teeth of the saw and was swung back at them, splitting in two; one part hit Mr. Church on the head.

Dr. M. V. Guilmant, house surgeon of the County Hospital, said death was due to bronchial pneumonia caused by prolonged unconsciousness as a result of head injuries.

The Coroner, Mr. R. G. Rose, recorded a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence.

GARDENING TIPS AND INSPIRATION FROM PARK END THATCH

As it's been such a dry spring, we need to regularly water the plants we want to survive the summer months. As some of you have requested, here we are with what might be considered a 'To Do List' for your gardens.

JUNE

- Ideally mid May but certainly by now, put pheromone traps to trap apple and plum codling moths in your fruit trees. These look like little green tents and attract the male moths which get trapped onto a sticky pad inside. Complete any pruning of spring flowering shrubs and Clematis montana, that way you should maximise their flowering potential for next year. Plant out hardened off modules of vegetable plants and keep well watered. Provide fresh water for birds to drink and bathe.
- Position hanging baskets. Feed, water and deadhead weekly.
- Hoe regularly to keep on top of weeds. Then water the area and mulch thickly with homemade compost or fresh lawn clippings to add nitrogen.
- Put in new plants with some granular fertiliser, irrigate and then mulch with home-made compost to provide micronutrients, keep in the moisture and suppress weeds. If you have plenty of compost spread it over the borders to help retain moisture in hot or dry weather.
- Finish planting containers and irrigate regularly with a little liquid feed in a full can of water.
- Plant dahlias and cannas in containers as they need winter protection.
- Cut the lawn once a week and if the grass is weak or patchy apply a summer fertiliser just before rain is forecast, otherwise water it in.
 Clip the edges to add the finishing touch. Leave wide strips of grass unmown for butterfly and moth larvae habitat and as a wildlife corridor through the garden. Or mow just a path through the grass leaving the rest for wildflowers to grow.
- Prune a deciduous magnolia once it is in full leaf. Members of the prunus family such as plums and gauges must be pruned when

they are in leaf, otherwise there is a chance that they could suffer from silver leaf disease which is fatal.

- Deadhead faded roses to encourage further blooms. If you look carefully you will see the next flower bud in the leaf axil two leaves below. Cut off the flower stalk just above that leaf, which also removes the top leaf which fed the faded flower. Feed and water roses regularly for continued blooms.
- Thin out vegetable seedlings which have been sown in the ground.
- Delay trimming hedges where birds are nesting until August when the broods should have fledged.

JULY

- Early in the month try cutting back hardy geraniums for a second flush of leaves and flowers later in the summer.
- If you want large potatoes remember to water the plants. To improve the keeping quality of onions stop watering them after mid-summer and bend the tops over in hot weather before they start to bolt.
- Reduce the length of finished flowered stems of shrubs such as philadelphus, deutzia, kolkwitsia and weigela.
- Thoroughly irrigate your containers in dry weather before the compost dries out completely.
- You can stop feeding roses after the end of July.
- Take cuttings of penstemon, fuchsias and other softwood and semi-ripe plants now and they should produce sufficient roots to pot up and harden off before winter.
- Add thin layers of lawn cuttings alternated with prunings and vegetable waste to the compost heap, cover and water if it looks dry. Try not to disturb wildlife such as grass snakes or bank voles, which may be living or breeding in the warmth and safety of the heap.
- Enjoy the butterflies if you have planted enough of their favourite feeding plants to attract them into your garden.

AUGUST

- Trim deciduous hedges after the birds have finished nesting.
- Trim conifer hedges leaving a few centimetres of green leaf. If you
 cut back to brown stems the hedge is unlikely to recover.
- Prune wisteria's new long shoots back to 5 buds. Prune outdoor grape vines back to 2 mature leaves in front of the developing grapes. These provide the energy to swell the grapes.
- If weather is hot, irrigate to keep plants alive, even hedges and especially vegetables and any young trees. Feeding now is a waste of money unless you want to keep the summer planted containers and hanging baskets looking good until autumn.
- Clip over lavender bushes taking off the dead flowers complete with stems and the top few leaves leaving at least 5 cms of green growth to harden before winter.
- Mid to late August brings the start of autumn, so later in the month scarify the lawn to remove dead grass roots and moss, aerate it with your garden fork and brush some horticultural lawn sand into the holes to assist with drainage.
- Check the packet instructions for sowing winter vegetables now, this will give them a couple of months to establish before cold and short days.
- Retrain climbing roses now that the new stems from the base are flexible and to allow room for further growth until October. The stems will harden in cold weather.
